

A message from Sue Brewer, Vicar of Christ Church.

Easter is so early this year! It seems as if we are just forgetting about Christmas... and already Easter is nearly here. Whereas some years the spring flowers are nearly over at Easter and the trees are in full leaf, this year it is a very different picture. As we look around only the earliest blossom is out, the magnolia buds and the leaf buds on the trees are about to burst open, and the first of the spring bulbs are peeping up through the soil.

The world around us, in fact, is full of the hope of things to come.

In the church, too, there's a sense of expectation and promise. Lent has a solemn and serious feel about it – even if you haven't given up chocolate or alcohol. At Christ Church our Lent Envelope scheme reminds us of those who are suffering because they lack basic medical provision, or clean water – so many of the things we take for granted. All around us there seem to be stories of pain and of suffering in the world.

Yet the Easter hope is just around the corner – over the next few weeks the story will be told in our special services, of how Jesus himself suffered and died, and of how he overcame even death to bring hope to all people.

Just as the spring shoots are breaking through the bare soil... so the signs of hope are there for those who will look. Wherever love and compassion win over hatred and anger, wherever communities are renewed, wherever family life is strengthened, wherever peace is restored.

As we look around us this Easter, I pray that we may all see signs of hope – and that we may ourselves become signs of hope to those around us.

CCADS Production April 24th 25th and 26th 2008



Christ Church Social Responsibility Committee

The committee has been in existence for many years now and is made up of representatives from the PCC and other 'volunteers' who meet about four times a year. Our remit is something like a mini social service; we aim to keep an eye on the needs of the parish. This is not always easy but with 'a little help from friends' we have over the years supported both the young and the old.

The PCC allocate us a budget for their annual 'giveaway' and from that we decide who to support financially by continuation of donations or looking for new appeals. Last year we purchased toys for the crèche, sponsored David Croydon's charity walk, made donations to the Guides, Darent Valley Hospital Lollipop appeal, local schools for RE resources, the Bereavement Group for Christmas Gifts, Women's Aid, Miracles Youth Club, Medi Alert Packs and of course funded all our Over 80's events.

Our chairman John Hougham helped undertake a disability audit of the Church and following his recommendations several adaptations were made. If anyone has any ideas about safety and accessibility around the church please let John know.

Gill Campbell has had the task of arranging lifts and is always looking for many drivers. Please see Gill if you can spare some time once a month or so to bring one of our less able parishioners to church.

Each Year Betty Martin holds a coffee morning to raise funds to send Easter Eggs to vulnerable children and after many years of organising the summer Over 80's tea parties has recently handed this over to Margot Edwards and Gill Campbell. Betty remains invaluable as the committee's eyes and ears and alerts us to those who may need extra support. Ann Lennard is our trusty treasurer and ensures we keep our accounts in order. Perhaps our most pleasing activity is arranging outings for the over 80's. With the help of volunteer

drivers we have been able to take this sprightly group to a variety of places including Greap Comp, Hall Place Garden, Aylesford Priory, Broadview Gardens, and a pre-Christmas trip to Notcutts Garden Centre.
