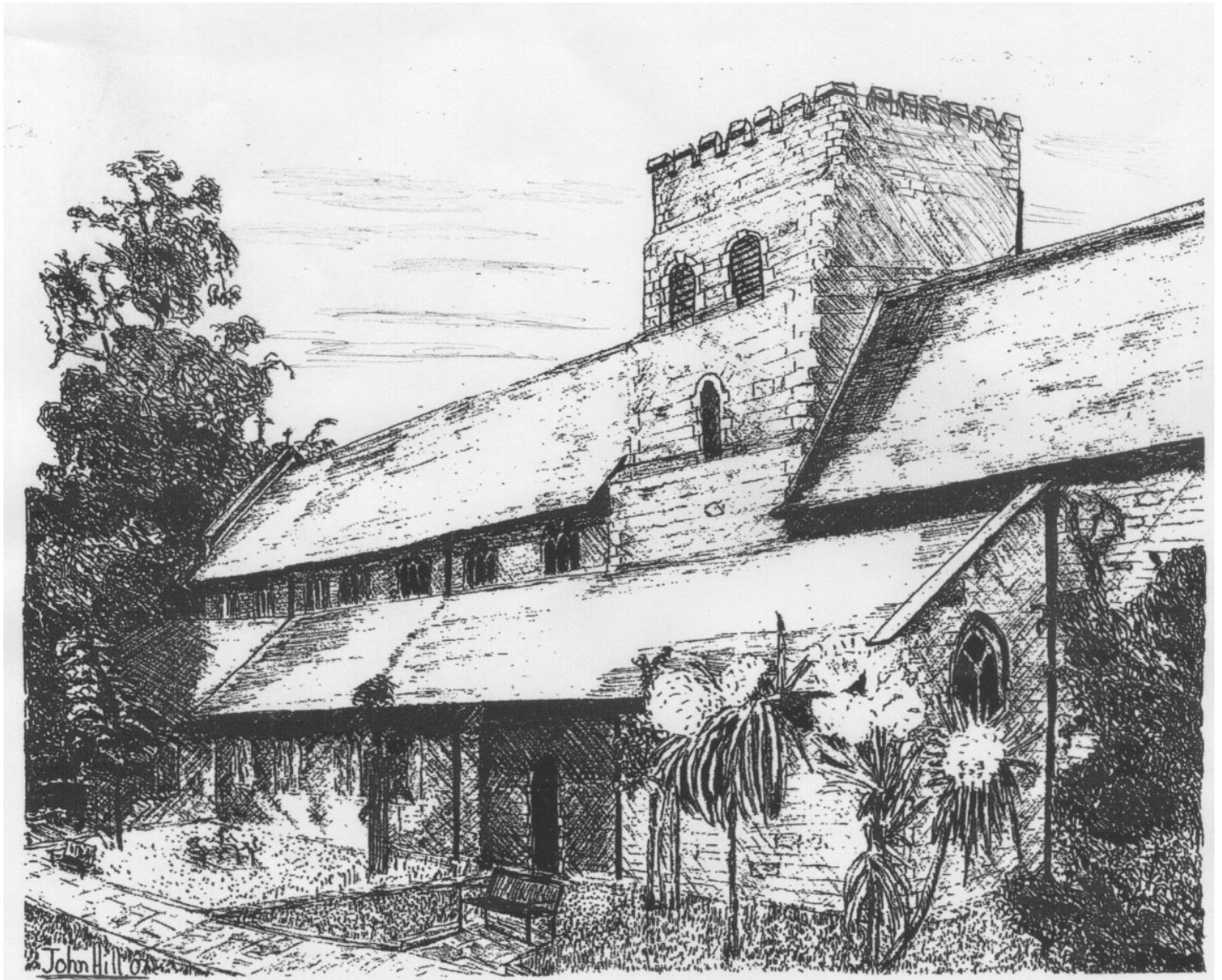

CHRIST CHURCH ADS DOES IT AGAIN!

The 2008 CCADS Spring production proved another winner for the audiences, who - if the night I attended was anything to go by - enjoyed themselves hugely. *The Farndale Avenue Housing Estate Townswomen's Guild Dramatic Society Murder Mystery* certainly provided enough material for laughs, and the five players took every advantage of them. We even had a warm-up man in the shape of Richard Aucott, who added to his usual introduction ("switch off mobile phones") with a couple of quips of his own. His busy Light and Sound Team earned several Brownie points ... as did the four stalwarts whose job it was to man the very busy backstage crew.

The opening music (Pink Panther) and the set, sparse but completely adequate, moved us forward to the opening introduction from Mrs Reece (Christine Kearsey). Having had a long experience myself of addressing Women's Institutes, I can vouch that she was the very model of a WI President: imperious and treating us all like children to be coaxed into doing things. The fact that at the end she managed to completely rewrite the script of the play that they were doing, so that, having got rid of the real villain, she was able to take over the role herself, was completely in character. Like everyone else in the cast she had a number of roles, including the French maid and the bumbling solicitor: all of which - if we were to believe anything in this crazy plot - she carried off beautifully.

The only member of the cast to play a single role (well, almost - he did get a quick "drag" entrance just before the interval!) was Gordon (playing Inspector O'Reilly) (Allister Kay). He had what was perhaps the best joke of all, when he was trying, in the best Hercule Poirot manner, to expose the criminal: "Don't worry, ladies, it's neither of you" when there were only three characters on stage. And who can forget the rewritten script: "look out, she's got a gnu!". We had a couple of instances of corpsing (or was that part of the script, too?), but John Hougham tells me that he was still laughing on the last night - and he was the director!

Janet Porter played Pawn, the butler, for all she was worth. The part required a great deal of athleticism, since there were several occasions when her exit as Pawn coincided with her entrance as Colonel King. The lopsided moustache just added to the fun. Her costume as Pawn was inspired, topped by that terrible wig, and her bent-over body. Thelma, Lady Bishop's daughter, played by Emily Stedman, gave us the perfect daughter of the big house. Her two-handed rendition with Gordon of "I could be happy with you" - cane and stick and all - which followed the script

mix-up in which the word “pain” kept occurring, were two of the highlights in the play. Audrey (Lynne Chesterton), as Lady Bishop, faced with all the mayhem going on around her, produced a well-observed character. Like all the other ladies she played three other members of her family, all of whom had unfortunate ends.

There were so many things I jotted down as the play progressed: the collapsing set, replaced upside down so that Gordon had difficulty warming himself at the ceiling-height fire; the chairs “dance” when the solicitor was to read the will; the clock striking; a terrible “North Country” accent; the door that wasn’t; props that were not there ... all carried off well, and adding to our enjoyment of what was, for the cast and director, a pretty difficult task. I think everyone in the audiences felt it well worth while to see CCADS doing it again ...entertaining us!

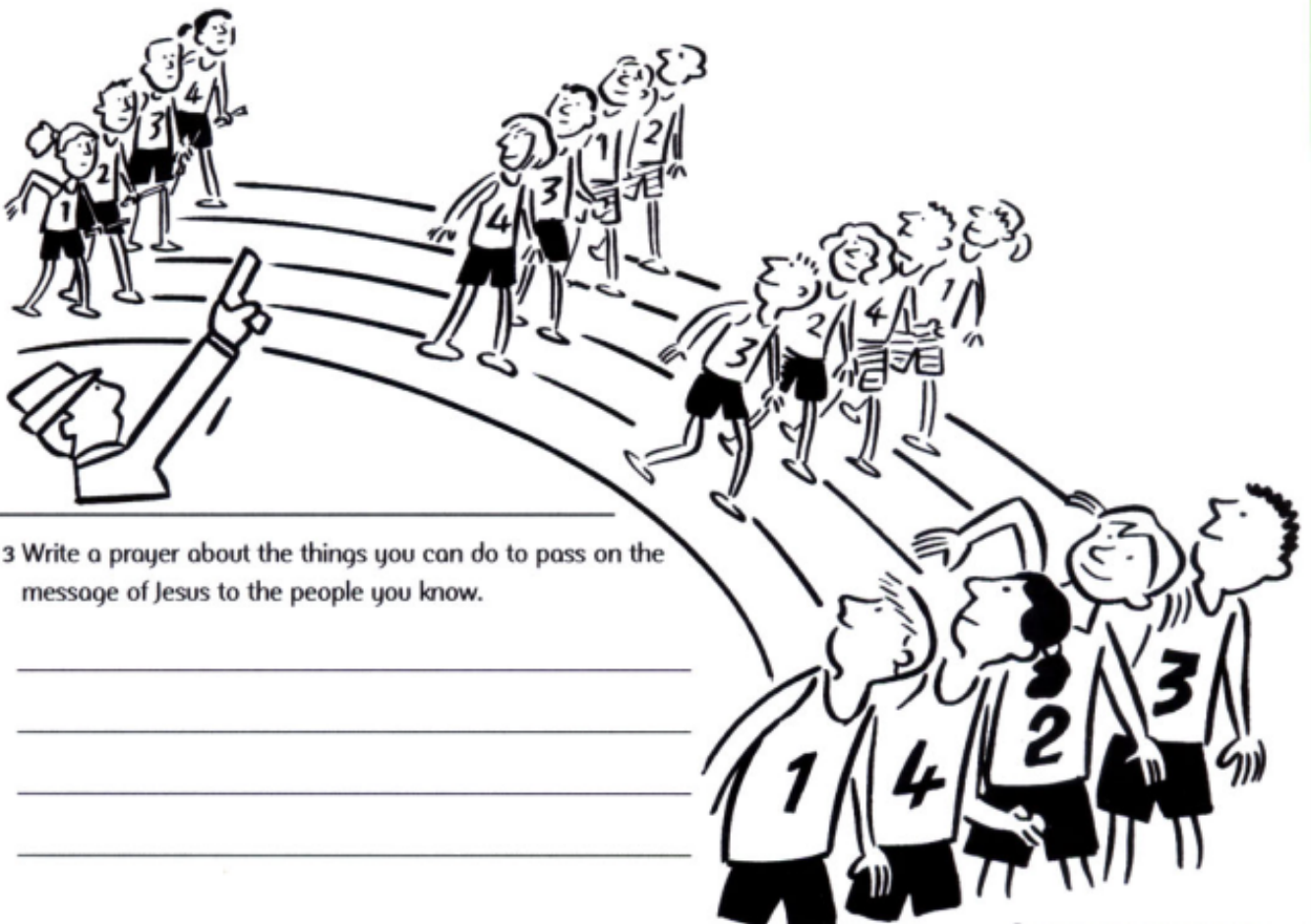
Jesus prayed, 'Father... I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do.'

EXPLANATION OF GOD

It was written by an 8-year-old named Danny Dutton, who lives in Chula Vista, CA.. He wrote it for his third grade homework assignment, to "explain God".

I wonder if any of us could have done as well?

EXPLANATION OF GOD

Don't skip church to do something you think will be more fun like going to the beach. This is wrong. And besides the sun doesn't come out at the beach until noon anyway.

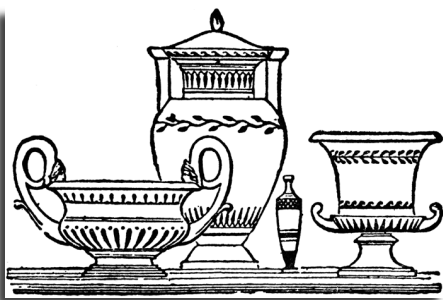
