


June is always a busy month and this June is no exception, Christ Church has its Rainbow Summer Fair where everyone is welcome, come along and enjoy strawberries and cream.



A CHURCH WARDEN'S NOTES

On 12th May the church celebrated the feast day of St Pancras. There was once a joke used on the music halls which went "St George for England! St Pancras for Scotland!" I remembered that joke the other day and, as I did so, a host of other things followed from it.

The significance of that joke is now lost in the mists of time, since the railway company who built the station in London, the Midland Railway, at the time were trying for the passenger traffic to Scotland, and who were lost as an entity in 1923. The station (opened in 1868) still stands, of course, with its magnificent roof and the even more wonderful hotel building in front. The hotel was designed by Giles Gilbert Scott, who also gave us the red telephone box – now doomed to extinction, since the advent of the mobile phone: when was the last time you used one? Scott designed the brick Roman Catholic church in Northfleet, opened in 1914.

The part of London called St Pancras is named after its medieval church, said to be one of the oldest sites of Christian worship in Britain. There is now a more recent church, although St Pancras Old Church remains as a place of worship. It was in that church where my great grandfather, Edward Fox, was baptised; later in life he was Christ Church parish clerk in Tunbridge Wells for over 40 years. Earl Camden developed the St Pancras area in the 1790s, giving it its new name of Camden Town.

Who was St Pancras? He was a Christian martyr, a Roman citizen who had converted to Christianity and was beheaded for his faith at the age of 14 around the year 304. His death was brought about during the time of the Roman emperor Diocletion who had gone on the rampage in an attempt to dispose of all Christians. It was he who had brought about the martyrdom of St Faith some fifteen years earlier – another connection with Christ Church.

The name Pancras is Greek, and means "the one that holds everything". All saints have been traditionally invoked against life's ills, and Pancras is called upon to help with cramp, false witness, headache, and perjury. He is also one of the many saints who is patron of children.

When I thought of the music hall joke I also thought to rework it. Why not "St George for England! St Pancras for Paris"? I'm not sure that St Genevieve would have too happy with that, though: she is said to have saved Paris by her prayers during the time Attila the Hun ... but that's another story



The church too was open and proved to be a warm and dry haven as well as old and interesting.


However, two hours of continual drenching proved to be enough and I retreated home with only half the gardens explored.
