## A CHURCH WARDEN'S NOTES

## The Church gardens

It is over a year now since work began to improve the church gardens. It all began when the corner plot by the car park had been cleared of trees and bushes. John Hougham told us that he wished to dedicate some trees in the area in memory of Peggy; they are now the centrepieces. Later the Mothers' Union planted a rose tree. There was also the beginnings of a mixed hedge along the rear of the triangular plot. At the same time, and still during the Interregnum, the Garden of Remembrance reorganisation began.

Since then, and as a result of requests in the Weekly Newsletter, donations of plants have been steadily coming in, so that the corner plot in particular is now filling up. The round bed by the hall, which had lost its central bush to old age, is now surrounded by sedum, and this year's crop of poppies has been a colourful surprise. We have had to say farewell to the rose bushes in the two front beds; they are well past their sell-by date; it is best not to replace them with roses for some years.

At the last PCC meeting it was agreed that we had need of a Garden Group to oversee the flower beds; we had already had some volunteers to join it, and indeed, at the last Working Party in July they had already made a start in taking stock of what we had. We also have an overseer for the Garden of Remembrance, although clearing the bins from there is a job which needs tackling: they can become very heavy.

Christ Church is a public building, and a particularly fine one. The surrounding area should reflect that; since we are aware of that, we have agreed to employ a new garden firm to keep it in good order, who will be starting work very soon. We are confident that everyone will be pleased with their work. The individual beds will continue to be the task of the Garden Group. If you think you can help with donations of plants, Ann Thrush, Lesley Harries and Mary Sargeant will be only too pleased to discuss it with you.

## Christ Church Hall

Towards the end of August the Hall windows are being completely replaced. The present ones are now 25 years old and showing their age. Once that is done, we shall need to purchase new curtains, and to have the flooring resealed. This will be costing the church a good deal of money.






## Walk for the children of Zimbabwe

The service in the Cathedral following the walk can only be described as a time of joyous praise and thanksgiving, due in no small way to a UK based Zimbabwean choir whose enthusiastic singing had to be heard to be believed.

All in all, the whole day had been a great time of fun and fellowship by the end of which, I had made a host of new friends from St John's.



## **RECOGNISING A STROKE**

remember the first three letters S T R

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify, unfortunately the lack of awareness spells disaster.

The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognise the symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say a bystander may be able to recognise a stroke by asking three simple questions

Ask the person to SMILE Ask the person to TALK – to SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE (Coherently, eg: It is a sunny day) Ask the person to RAISE BOTH ARMS

ANOTHER "sign" of a stroke is this: Ask the person to "stick out" their tongue. If the tongue is crooked, if it goes to one side or the other, that is also the indication of a stroke.

IF THE PERSON HAS TROUBLE WITH ANY ONE OF THESE TASKS CALL 999 AND DESCRIBE THE SYMPTOMS.
