

A CHURCH WARDEN'S NOTES

From time to time I read obituaries that really show the fullness of a life led. Last week I read just such an obituary, and felt I should share it with readers of the magazine.

Phyllis Thom, born Phyllis Mary Elizabeth Briggs in Bexhill-on-Sea and having just celebrated her 100th birthday in June, died on September 16th. Her father was a chaplain in Paris, but Phyllis was orphaned in her early teens. She took up nursing as a career, working first in Manchester and then London, but she had a passion for travel, and was, by 1941, working in Malaya with the Colonial Nursing Service. As the Japanese invasion began she was evacuated to Singapore, and thence on to a ship bound for Australia. The voyage was curtailed when the ship was captured, and all passengers dumped on a jetty in Sumatra, without food or water, before being marched to their first prison camp.

Trials and tribulations followed: during the next 3 ½ years she, like thousands of other women and children, endured endless hunger, pointless cruelty, hardship and indignity in prison camps barely fit for animals. At one point she became seriously ill and almost died; but she and five other nurses devoted themselves to the care of other prisoners. At one point the five of them cared for 500 male prisoners. Three years after being left on the jetty she found herself back there, but in a custom-built camp with proper kitchens, a far cry from what she had had to endure until then. As the Japanese surrender came, her camp commandant announced that "Now we will be friends".

Her captivity featured in the TV series *Tenko* (the answer she had to give at daily roll call); in the film *Paradise Road*; and a book, *Women Beyond the Wire*.

She returned to nursing in Malaya in 1946; the following year she married Robbie Thom (who died in 1967). She retired to Bournemouth where she became a volunteer for Barnado's.

Earlier this year an idea blossomed in our minds that it would be rather lovely to return to Gravesend to celebrate our Golden Wedding. We came to a Sunday morning Eucharist a few months ago, met some old friends and tentively made noises to the current team about our idea. We couldn't have met with greater kindness and courtesy. Miraculously and with unfailing help and imagination our plans fell wonderfully into place.

And so, on the 6th September – a Saturday – to the day we stood in the very same place for a Service giving thanks and praise to God for all the blessings and upholding we have received during these fifty years. Some friends from those Christ Church days were among those able to be with us for this Service which was followed by a lunch in the hall. It was great to return to this area which held so many memories for us both. We had a wonderfully happy day.

We wish to say thankyou so very much to everyone who assisted and encouraged us – to Joan, Vivien, Janice and your vicar Sue Brewer.


A Year in the Life of Christ Church – DVD.



Gardening Tips for October

Now is the time to reflect and to put the effects of this years terrible summer behind.
Gardening has always been the hobby of optimistic and resilient people, and to consider, that after the last two bad summers, next year must be better!

October is the month to clean up, remove the summer bedding, cut down herbaceous plants, reduce by half, bush roses that can be loosened by autumn and winter winds and prune back climbing roses to reduce their bulk. Rose pruning for shape and bloom will be done in the spring,

Keep clearing fallen leaves from grass areas, do not wait until any surrounding trees have completed their leaf drop. Continue to mow grass, not below 1 inch whenever the surface is dry enough.

When the soil is reasonably workable, continue to plant winter bedding and complete bulb planting. Tulip bulbs can be left until the middle of November if necessary.
