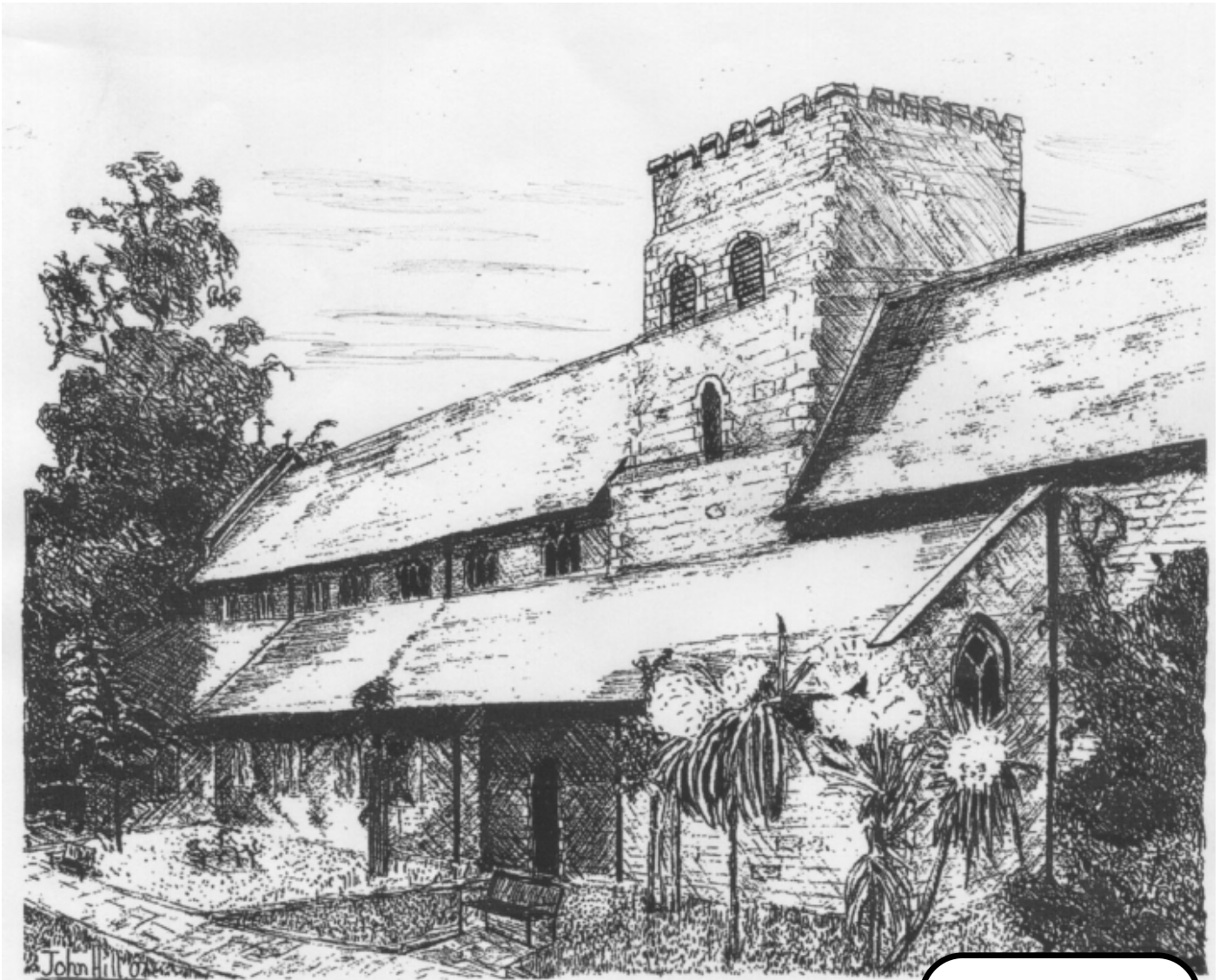

Using a modern vivid translation, actor Lance Pierson performs an eighty minute version of Mark's Gospel, bringing the story alive and close to the audience.

About the Performer:

Lance Pierson is an actor who specialises in Bible performance. He has a unique gift of lifting the written words off a page and making them come alive for his audience.

Since 1986 he has performed his one man shows in churches of all denominations and in a variety of venues from St Paul's Cathedral to the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. He has presented the Bible on the main stages of the Keswick Convention, Spring Harvest and Easter People. In addition he has led workshops on reading the Bible aloud for churches, Bible colleges and at diocesan training events.

Lance lives in London and is a member of St Matthew's Church in Fulham.

He launched his one-man performance of Mark's Gospel in 2004 with the aim of bringing the 'good news' within the reach of everyone and of giving people an overview of the whole story at one sitting.

About the Play:

Lance's performance of *Mark's Gospel* is accessible, enjoyable and moving, using a modern translation (Alan T Dale's *New World*) to give the story a contemporary, relevant feel. It takes no background knowledge or technical language for granted. It is not a recital, but a one-man play performed with simple movement and characterisation.

For maximum effect he has an accompanying PowerPoint presentation with pictures of modern day Israel which acts as a backdrop and helps set each scene.

Lance feels that to hear every word of the Gospel would be too long for most audiences today. So he has selected two halves of about 40 minutes each. The first takes the chief highlights of chapters 1-10; the second tells the story of Holy Week, which is most of chapters 11-16.

This month I interviewed Muhunnthan at the Echo supermarket.

How long have you been at Echo Square? 6 years

Why did you choose to come to Echo Square?

The convenience store was already here so we bought the business.

What can you tell me about the building?

Not much! It used to be a Co-op shop about 20 years ago.

(Maybe some members of Christchurch will remember more about this building...?)

How many staff do you have?

One fulltime, one part time, my wife and me.

What do you offer to customers?

We are open from 7a.m. to 10 p.m., seven days a week.

We sell a wide range of groceries, milk, an off licence, ice creams, newspapers and magazines, cigarettes, videos, bakery and have a lottery and cash machine which we put in.

What is it like running a business in Echo Square?

It's a good spot to run a business because of all the schools round about.

There are 4 or 5 schools many of whose children and adults come past or

near us every day. Our phone is G 364591.

Do you feel Christchurch is part of the community?

Yes, it is a very friendly church. I know lots of people from it and many of them use the shop. Christchurch is good to the community.

You have helped Christchurch with hot cross buns and mince pies throughout the year.

Yes. I am Hindu but there is no temple near us here so we are happy to help people from another religion. My wife likes to come down to the church to sit in it about twice a week.

What about the road outside now it is one way? Has this affected business?

Some people like it, others don't as depending on where they live, they have to go further to get to the A2. It made a big difference at first. I like it though the council say they may re-open it once they have done gas works nearer Christchurch. It is not likely to be for some months yet.

Guides vs Scouts

There has been a lot in the press recently about a large increase in the number of girls joining Scouts. This is particularly in the Explorer area where girls would join the Senior Section in guides. This is the section of young women between the ages of 14 and 26 and an area which locally has been without a leader for some years. However we now have a young woman who has come forward to get this section up and running so hopefully it will be active within the next few weeks.

Personally I don't look on it as a competition which the media try to turn stories like this into. I feel that both Guiding and Scouting give young people the opportunity to do things of interest that will benefit them for the rest of their lives and it keeps them from hanging around on street corners looking aimless.

Girlguiding U.K. takes an annual census each February among every unit in the country so it is understandable that figures are not yet available for this year but the previous figures show that we are the largest voluntary youth organisation for girls and young women in the U.K. with around 575,000 members.

The area where Girlguiding and Scouting are both short is adult volunteers. Without them neither organisation can survive. I joined Guiding when my daughter was a ten year old having just started Guides. Her Guider asked me if I would like to help out which I agreed to although at that time I was involved with

Scouting. I soon realised that I was looking forward to my Guide evening each week as much as my daughter and became more and more involved. I am still involved, and enjoying what I now do within the movement, after thirty one years. I have been to places I would never have been to, done things I would never have done, and learnt, through these opportunities, skills that I would never have learnt if I hadn't become part of the movement. More than anything I have an enormous amount of fun during these years.

Maybe you were never a Brownie or Guide and feel that you don't know enough about Guiding to help out but have the time on your hands. Well I had never been a Brownie or a Guide either but once working with these young people I was very soon hooked and learnt as I went along.

Please if you can help out, if only for a couple of hours now and again, give me a ring so that we can have a chat about the options and I can put you in touch with your local commissioner. Without your help it could mean units closing down and not only the girls missing out but you too.
