Notes by a Churchwarden January 2011

I have just come home after attending the memorial service to Hilary Devereux, along with 70 of her friends and relations. Marian and I are among those who have known her personally but for a relatively short period of her life. That short period was one of great gladness that we were able to get to know her: we were her regular drivers who enabled her to attend Christ Church on Sundays and Wednesdays.

In the mid 1990s, however, I began the original work which finally emerged as my history of the church. Among the items of research I used to compile it was Hilary's own history which she put together for the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of Christ Church moving in 1935 to its present site from Parrock Road. This was, incidentally, completed by Barbara (Hilary always called her by her full first name, eschewing the 'Bar' used by almost everyone else!) Tyrell, who added the artwork. So I guess I got to know her through that much earlier than face to face.

Marian and I were also of the small group of people helping her to move into her new flat in Nelson Court. She was very confident before the move that having pared her belongings down, there would be no problems about fitting them in; she had drawn up floor plans, she assured us. The staunchest helpers, doing most of the heavy lifting, were our local milkman, Andy and his brother. Unfortunately as with most best-laid plans, the flat was soon full to overflowing, and even more desperate paring down had to take place fairly quickly after the move. One problem proved to be the modern care home Elf and Safety ruling that all power points are placed on the wall and not at floor level. This meant that they were often below the level of the tops of furniture such as a sideboard! With the help of more friends, order was pretty soon restored after some weeks.

One thing that emerged for us was her love of art: her books revealed that. We learnt about all her other attributes particularly her musical ones only during her memorial service, and were very pleased to meet her cousin Gavin and other relations.

In this issue of the Magazine I hope to be able to include a Rudyard Kipling poem which I think she would have loved if she didn't already know it. Kipling himself, a moralist if not a religious, was an artist, inheriting that talent from his father.

Our churches cannot become museums, they must be full of life in all its aspects. Ancient can thus be modern."

The 2011 Census for England and Wales is coming.

The census team ask for the support of Kent Youth Service

On 27 March 2011 all residential households in the country will be taking part in a census. The census is held once every ten years by the Office for National Statistics and helps build a picture of today's society.

How does this help the Youth Service?

The data collected is used by central and local government, health authorities and many other organisations to identify the need for housing, education, health, transport and youth services for years to come. The census statistics also feed into the allocation of funding for local authorities, so it is crucial the population estimate is as accurate as possible.

Posters and leaflets can be provided for use at events you might be involved in. To assist Kent youth workers a curriculum resource pack for the 2011 Census is currently being developed and will be available at www.kent.gov.uk/curriculumpacks very soon!

Memories of C.C.A.D.S.

C.C.A.D.S. has been part of my life for a very long time. My mother and father – Fred and Mollie Gorrige were members of the Concert party run by Vic Carter. When Vic had had enough of the rehearsal (in his house) he would remove his tie, wind up the clock and say “Right I’m off”! leaving his wife to usher everyone home and clear up!

In 1949 they joined the C.C.A.D.S. under Mr Edwards, with other Church members Dr and Mrs Tunstall, Betty Martin, Dora Pittman, Janet Turner, Daphne Young, Brian Morris, John and Kay Moir, Harold and Rene Price and many others, the Christ Church family has supported with membership and audience all through its long history. Hilary Devereux was a wonderful Character actress whose expressions were priceless. Nearer the present, Pat King, John Hougham, Rosemary Spicer have kept the link with Christ Church as strong as ever. From then until their deaths both were regular members of the Society.

At the beginning the costumes were hired from Fox’s in London. They were delivered to our house in large wicker hampers. The ladies of the Society, particularly Mrs Toulson made a lot of the women’s costumes assisted by Phyllis Crouch and Mrs Hudd.

There used to be a box office, manned by Harold Price, in the large hall two weeks before the play. The sets in the old hall, were built by members of the Society during rehearsal time. Phillip Roder, Bill Crouch, Lee Craddock and other non-acting members, worked

wonders with stairs, two level sets, and moving pictures and ornaments for The Poltergeist. In the new hall, the set can not be constructed until the weekend before the performance, which means a long day and frayed nerves to try and get everything ready for the first night.

My father acted in many plays and on one occasion broke his arm playing football the week before the play! As he was a count dressed in scarlet uniform, it was passed off as “fortunes of war”!! My mother also acted; she had many character cameo roles. Her biggest role was as Mrs Puffin.

When Kay Moir retired as prompt my mother took over and had many heart stopping moments trying to find the place where actors had jumped to. She was a reassuring presence to everyone on and off stage.

My father continued to act for many years and eventually became the regular producer. In his “retirement” he sometimes took on small roles giving everyone else nightmares when he ad-libbed because he couldn’t remember the cue line. He continued to support the Society until his death.

My own stage debut was as one of the children with Nigel Spicer, Rosemary’s brother, in Quality Street in 1953. We were terrified! After that I couldn’t wait to reach the required minimum age for entry to C.C.A.D.S. My mother was endlessly patient helping Dad and I learn our words! I suppose the play that was the greatest challenge was Sister Bonaventure with Kathleen Bunyan as the Sister giving me asylum. The most entertaining were the character role where timing was crucial.

When I married I persuaded Michael to join. We sometimes acted together which helped with line learning. Later on he took on the role of producer bringing Hobson’s Choice to life with Roger Howe as Will Mossop. His Northern accent was just right for the play. Other classics he produced were “When we are married”, “Pygmalion”, “The importance of being earnest”, “An Inspector Calls” and “The Prisoner of Second Avenue”.

Although I retired from C.C.A.D.S. when I took over as organist, Michael continued for some years, acting and producing.

Neither of us are members now but look back on our involvement with C.C.A.D.S. with great pleasure.




Rusty and Granddad's 6.8 Mile Run

Me (Rusty [Sarah Rawlinson] - Assistant Beaver Scout Leader) and my fellow Scouter (Granddad [Chris Price] - Assistant Explorer Leader) have decided to try and raise some money for the wall that is on the outside of our Scout Hall where we meet.

Skip was asking people to come up with various ideas. On my way home I had a sort of "vision" that I should do something. I decided I was going to run. How far I didn't know! After doing a bit of research I set myself on the challenge of running a 6.8 Mile run. I was talking to the other Assistant Explorer Leader who told me I should ask Granddad to take part. He said "you're crazy, but I'm in!"

So that is where we got up to. We have both been training since December time for the run, and only have 9 weeks left!

It will be held on 26th March 2011. The start is at Rochester Bridge and our finishing destination is at 1st Windmill Hill Scout Hall.

We will start about 11 O'clock I believe.

In total we need to raise over £9,000 for the wall. We don't expect to raise this much, however anything that we do raise will make a dent in that total!

It is me and Granddad that will be completing the run. People are welcome to join us, but this will have to be discussed before hand, as we will need to find more suitable destinations where people can come along and join in!

Also I don't want to start being liable for people that are running! I'd prefer to kill my lungs and legs for the cause! (O and the knee's too!)

The reason behind why it is going to cost so much money is due to the fact that we are in a conservation area so our wall needs to be like for like, same as the brick that we need to buy!

The Waterhole Sandy Bank Road

The Waterhole in Sandy Bank Road has been the home of Scouting since the 1970's, first as Christ Church Scout Group and now as 1st Windmill Hill Scout Group, when a team of scouters, parents and supporters dismantled an old hut at the paper mill and re-erected it in its present position.



The Waterhole was so named as it is situated on old water board land and within the boundaries there is still an artesian well. The wall surrounding the property is part of the original buildings and as it is in a conservation area any alterations have to be in keeping with the plan for the area (strange as all the buildings close to it have been built in recent times and look nothing like the wall of the property). Last year it was discovered that the high wall on the Sandy Bank Road side of the property was bulging out and in danger of collapse, Gravesham Borough Council asked the Scout Group to make the wall safe. Permission was sought and granted for the trees causing the wall to bulge to be removed, the most dangerous part of the wall was dismantled to make it safe. Gravesham Borough Council have insisted that the wall be re-built to its original specification, which means new bricks will have to be specially made and builders employed to carry out the work.
