Food and Fasting

There seems to me to be a distinct focus on food and fasting this Lent. Our ecumenical Lent course book, and novel, 'Chocolat' explores a range of relational themes including temptation, sin, domestic violence, the manipulation of power, and the inclusion or exclusion of strangers. All wrapped up in chocolate and bound up within the life of a community in a French village.

This has prompted me to revisit the last two years that I have been involved in the Gravesham Foodbank. One of the most important aspects of the Foodbank is the initial welcome that the person receives as they enter the building so often apprehensive, and sometimes defensive, because they have been driven to a crisis point in their lives. To rely on the generosity of others because, quite simply, they cannot afford to put food on the table.

Conversations have revealed a range of complex issues. One lady came in on

behalf of her friend who was so mortified with her desperate situation that she could not bear to face the Foodbank volunteers. Another was bruised and battered. Another made redundant and frightened that he would lose his home. Another lost her job because of ill health, and another a refugee - a stranger in exile, each with their own unique story. Not characters in a novel but a human being in need which led me to reflect further on the impact of hunger and food, its availability or not. It prompted me to record what I ate in one day, and to cost it out. The following day to eat sparingly and put the money 'saved' aside for Lent giving.

God has blessed me abundantly. 1 in 5 people in this country live below the breadline. Food may not be on their table. So, perhaps, this Lent, it may be timely to provide for a stranger with a giving heart and generous hospitality.

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me... <u>Matthew 25:35</u>

As usual we've all had a lovely time together and very much hope that everyone will join us again for our next First Steps service on 9th April. Hopefully the sun will be shining then, too.

Chemin Neuf community comes to Lambeth Palace

In a ceremony with guests from Roman Catholic, Anglican and Lutheran churches, Archbishop Justin welcomed four members of an international ecumenical community to Lambeth Palace in a 'radical and exciting step' for Christian unity. The Archbishop of Canterbury received four members of the international ecumenical foundation Chemin Neuf to live as a praying community at Lambeth Palace.

The community, who have been invited to live at Lambeth Palace by the Archbishop, are a married Anglican couple, lone and Alan Morley-Fletcher; a Lutheran training for ministry, Oliver Matri; and a Roman Catholic consecrated sister, Ula Michlowicz.

Together they will share in the daily round of prayer that underpins the Archbishop's ministry, and further the ecumenical and international dimensions of his work; supporting the first of three priority areas for Archbishop Justin's ministry over the coming years, the renewal of prayer and the religious life within the Church.

Confirmation at Christ Church

Each year at Christ Church a number of people who are new to faith, or who feel ready to make a fresh commitment of faith, decide to be Confirmed or to Renew their Baptismal Vows.

Confirmation in the Church of England marks the point of the Christian journey at which those who have been baptised affirm their faith for themselves.





Renewal of Baptismal Vows allows those who have already been confirmed to make a fresh commitment of faith this may be appropriate for all sorts of reasons: perhaps you wandered away from faith for a bit, and are ready to return; perhaps you are at a turning point in your life and want to mark a fresh commitment for the road ahead; or perhaps you feel God is calling you to a new role or ministry – whatever the reason, you are welcome.

At Christ Church we offer an opportunity to prepare for Confirmation or Renewal of Baptismal Vows once a year. The next group will begin during 2014, preparing candidates for confirmation later in the year. If you would like to be part of this, or would like to know more about what might be involved, speak to one of the clergy.

Diocese of Rochester: General Synod Elections 2015

Be Properly Represented 'BPR'

An initiative to make sure that you are properly represented in your churchand an invitation to lunch!

Although there are encouraging signs that legislation to allow women bishops will have been passed before the next Synod is formed in 2015, there will be many other issues on which you may want your voice to be heard. These are likely to include:

- Issues related to marriage, gender and sexuality
- How we pay for ministry
- Ecumenical and Anglican communion relations
- Interfaith relations

- Worship
- Mission and Evangelism in our multi faith society
- Christian Ministries with Young People
- Social justice

Be Properly Represented is an initiative by 3 former General Synod members who are not standing again. Its overarching aim is to promote active engagement in the processes that lead to the election of General Synod members so that, between them, the elected members fairly represent the whole diocese (geographical spread, age, gender, race etc.) respecting the spiritual depth and intellectual breadth of the Church of England..

The **BPR** initiative has three strands in order to:

- Encourage a wide range of clergy and laity to stand for election to the General Synod
- Ensure that Deanery Synod members know that they are the people who elect members to the House of Laity of the General Synod, and that they exercise their right to vote.
- Raise awareness among all church members in parishes and deaneries, so that they can ask questions, make nominations and take an active interest in Deanery, Diocesan and General Synod elections.


A few facts:

- Rochester has 5 lay members and 4 clergy members of the General Synod.
- There are 7 men and 2 women
- Their ages range from 47 79
- Most live in the Tonbridge Archdeaconry see map
- None live in the Rochester Archdeaconry
- In the 2010 elections 99 clergy out of a possible 288 and 214 lay deanery synod members out of a possible 532 did not use their vote.
- Deanery Synod elections are in March 2014

What can you do?

- Think about standing for Deanery or General Synod
- Look around, think about people you know who would be good Deanery Synod or General Synod members and encourage them consider standing.

- Ask those who are standing for election what they think about issues that concern you, so that you can use your vote wisely.
- Remind Deanery Synod members to use their vote in the General Synod elections in 2015.

There we will give a brief talk on what is involved, how to stand for election etc, and answer any questions that you might have. What do you see, nurses, what do you see? What are you thinking when you look at me? A crabbit old woman, not very wise, Uncertain of habit, with far-away eyes: Who dribbles her food and makes no reply When you say in loud voice, "I do wish you'd try; Who seems not to notice the things that you do, And forever is losing a stocking or shoe Who, unresisting or not, lets you do as you will With bathing and feeding, the long day to fill. Is that what you're thinking, is that what you see? Then open your eyes, you're not looking at me! I'll tell you who I am as I sit here so still, As I move at your bidding, as I eat at your will. I'm a small child of ten with a father and mother, Brothers and sisters who love one another. A young girl at sixteen with wings on her feet, Dreaming that soon now a lover she'll meet. Remembering the vows that I promised to keep. At twenty-five now I have young of my own Who need me to build a secure happy home. A women of thirty my young now grow fast Bound to each other with ties that should last. At forty my young now will soon be gone But my man stays beside me to see I don't mourn. At fifty once more babies play round my knee, Again we know children, my loved one and me. Dark days are upon me, my husband is dead, I look at the future, I shudder with dread, For my young are all busy rearing young of their own. And I think of the years and the love I have known. I'm an old woman now and nature is cruel, 'Tis her jest to make old age look like a fool. The body it crumbles, grace and vigour depart, And now there's a stone where I once had a heart. But inside this old carcase a young girl still dwells, And now and again my battered heart swells. I remember the joys, I remember the pain, And I'm loving and living life over again. I think of the years all too few - gone so fast, And accept the stark fact that nothing can last So open your eyes, nurses, open and see, Not a crabbit old woman, look closer - SEE ME
