BIBLE NOTES

John Surman and the new Christ Church War Memorial

Then, a few weeks ago I received an enquiry from a relative of his who was researching the family history and who provided me with further information. This enabled me to piece together important

wo years ago the original Christ Church World War One Memorial was discovered in a worn and damaged condition, buried in the church gardens. This led to a series of events culminating in the dedication of the new plaque now in pride of place in the Warrior Chapel. One of these events followed my decision to explore the backgrounds of each of the 62 casualties commemorated on the memorial, which was

then illustrated by a major exhibition mounted by my wife Veronica.

You will find a brief summary of my findings for each of the named individuals on the Christ Church website. This has produced from time to time since then, enquiries from descendants and other relatives of those honoured, who have found the website page via a search engine and seeking information mainly about family history.

I also have a more comprehensive booklet, a copy of which is placed in the Warrior Chapel, which served as the basis for the exhibition. This contains information on 61 of the 62 casualties, but I found nothing to explain the presence of John Arthur Surman, who did not appear to have served in the armed forces.

What I did know was that he was born in Gravesend in 1898, and in 1901 he was living with his widowed father, George, and nine older siblings at 35 Peter Street Gravesend. His father was a stoker on a steam barge. In 1911, he was a school pupil living at 1 Violet Cottages, New Street, at the home of his eldest sister, Ethel, now married to a Mr Lucas, and three of his brothers.



details of his life and death.

It turned out that after school John became a Boy Deckhand, probably around 1912, on the Tug Doria. This was owned by the William Watkins Thames tug company, based in Gravesend, from 1909 to 1947. Soon after war broke out, the Doria was requisitioned as an Armed Boarding Steamer. These initially carried two three pounder guns (later being equipped with heavier guns), were under the command of a Royal Navy officer, and carried out a variety of duties. Some were equipped with torpedoes and depth charges for anti-submarine duty escorting merchant ships. In December 1915, the Doria was at Invergordon, a major naval base in the North of Scotland, later providing ships of the Battle of Jutland. At the beginning of the war, a lengthy pier was built, equipped with railway lines enabling oil to be pumped to the tanks of ships waiting to be refuelled. It was off a pier, probably this one, that John fell and was drowned on the 24th December 1915, aged just 16 years.

Many years later, Doria was part of the Dunkirk operation in 1940. Amongst the crew of a sister ship, the Challenge, was Mick Wenban's father.

people," God said. "But first I will tell you the best way to live."




Boom! Boom! rolled the thunder, zig-zag went the lightning across the sky. It was very scary.




