

10<sup>th</sup> December 2008

Our naughty little sheep has been very busy since our last First Steps service. If you came to our Christingle service you may have seen him put in an appearance. He had a walk about so that he could have a good look at the families arriving for the service and then he asked me to put him up onto the pulpit so that he could see all of the children, when their candles were lit. He promised me faithfully that he wouldn't jiggle about but I was a bit nervous and asked the children to keep an eye on him and to let me know if he looked wobbly. But he was very well behaved which was quite a relief. I didn't want him to get his wool singed!

He's also been into Church twice to see our Pre-school children sing their special songs and say their 'Thank you' prayers and he really looks forward to joining them now. He keeps an eye on them to make sure that they behave and they keep an eye on him, so everybody wins! He told me that he's been a little disappointed because Betty Martin hasn't given him a cuddle lately and wondered if his wool needs a wash! And the children haven't done their Marching song either, which is a particular favourite of his, so he thinks that next time he'll have to remind them! When the children came into the Church this morning Peter Shearan was wearing a special Christmas hat and our naughty little sheep whispered to Colin Parsonson that he would rather like one too, just for the festive season! We'll have to ask Lesley Harries, who has made some lovely Nativity costumes for the Preschool, if she can make a special hat for him, though time is getting on now, so he may have to wait until Christmas 2009.

We've got another cold sunny day for our First Steps service and once again we have some new faces as well as our well-loved and much appreciated regulars. Susannah and her Mum, Mary Kate, are joining us for the first time, as is Lily's Godmother, Helen and her two little boys, Connor and Calum. They've come all the way from Paddock Wood, isn't that great! I hope that they'll all want to join us again. In our service today we are thinking about the Christmas Story and we've borrowed some lovely knitted Nativity figures from our Preschool. They have been knitted by Susan Sacre and Linda Parsonson, two member of our congregation and we're going to use them to tell that special story. First of course, when every one is settled, we begin by singing Candle time. Daniel and Martha are both fast asleep in their buggies though we're not too sure how long that will last once the jingle bells get going! We light some special candles today, thinking of Gill's Mum and my Mum, both of whom are not too well at the moment. Freya asks if we can light a candle for her friend Eleanor's new baby sister and we also light a candle for Lily who is going to big school in January. We are certainly going to miss her!

Then it's time for us to tell that oh so important story and I hand the figures round so that the children can help me by bringing them up to put on our little altar as our story unfolds. Firstly Mary and Joseph take their place followed by baby Jesus in his little manger with its tiny knitted cover. Then three shepherds appear with four little knitted sheep. It is only then that we realise that another significant sheep is missing. Oh no! What has happened to our naughty little sheep? We all know that it's his favourite bit of the story and we can't let him miss it! So the children and I look around the Church to see if we can find him. We all look this way and that and then Lily tracks him down. Well done that girl! He's standing in the cowshed, which is sitting on a table towards the back of the church. It is the very same cowshed that we will be using at our Crib service and later that naughty sheep tells me that he was trying it out, getting a feel for the place! Would you believe it?

When normality has finally been resumed, three kings with their gifts are carefully placed on our little altar. Our tableau is complete and so is our story. As Joan Bennett plays the piano for us we sing some of our favourite Christmas carols like. Away in a manger and Little Jesus Sweetly Sleep. Then there is much enthusiastic bell jingling as we sing Jingle Bells twice, with gusto! Could this be when Daniel and Martha wake up? I wouldn't be at all surprised! And then most important of all, we thank God for sending Jesus to us; that Gift that keeps on giving!

We finish with Candletime and some of the children help to blow the candles out. Then we make our way into the Hall. Tilly is looking after our naughty little sheep and making sure that he gets there safely and doesn't wander off again. Now it's time for refreshments, play and chat. Our naughty little sheep is content to sit on the hatchway to the kitchen watching the children play and make Christmas decorations to hang on the Christmas tree by the Church door. He tells me that he's feeling very tired after all the excitement of the last few days and he doesn't really feel much like playing. He thinks he'll save himself for his starring role in the Crib Service. And he's very sad that Lily is going to school and he won't be able to play with her any more. But he hopes she has a lovely time at school and makes lots of new friends.

Very soon it's time to go home and there are pictures for the children to take with them to colour. We hope that they will be a reminder of that very special story about a tiny baby born in a cowshed and laid in a manger, God coming to earth in Jesus Christ! And we hope that they will join us at the Crib service at 4pm on Christmas Eve to hear the story once again. When we meet together for our next First Steps service it will be the 14<sup>th</sup> January and we will be thinking about Looking after God's world, very appropriate for a New Year! In the meantime we wish you all a very Happy New Year. God Bless.

#### SMARTGARDENS

GARDENS As I continue my series on the lives of those who live

R and work in and around Echo Square, I have interviewed

Kevin Lock and Stuart who together make up

Smart Gardens.

### How long has Smartgardens been working in Gravesend?

We have worked together since 2003, so for 6 years although we have 10 years experience in gardening.

## Why did you choose to set up in Gravesend?

We live locally and plan to become THE local, reliable garden maintenance company for Gravesend and Northfleet.

Keeping our work local helps us to trim costs such as petrol and to establish a regular client base.

### How many staff do you have?

Two main staff: Kevin and Stuart, plus Richard who helps out when necessary and when he can and Kevin's father who is a retired carpenter who can be called on for help with decking and other related skills.

We have 2 vans to take us around with our extensive and good quality equipment.

We each have £5 million public liability insurance.

## Do you have gardening skills training?

Yes, we have both taken RHS single courses in skills such as fruit pruning, hedging etc..

Kevin is the plantsman and Stuart works more on hedging and lawns so we complement each other.

### What do you offer to customers?

75-80% of our work is maintenance; 20-25% is landscaping. We offer free visits and competitive quotes for small and large jobs and we expect to treat all our customers the same. Among our regular customers are many elderly people whom we know trust us.

We undertake grass cutting and strimming (from as little as £5); shrub pruning, hedge cutting, small tree work, weeding and managing of borders, jet washing of driveways and patios.

In landscaping we can offer garden design, turfing and lawncare, planting schemes, garden tidying and clearance work.

## What is it like running a local business?

People of Gravesend expect a fair job for a fair price and that is what we aim to give. They are friendly, honest folk and we are gradually limiting our business to Gravesend and Northfleet as work permits. We are proud to be recognised as the local garden maintenance firm!

A typical week would be: Monday:one off jobs; Tues., Weds., Thurs.:regular customers; Fri.: mainly grass cutting so people have tidy lawns for the weekend, and we also work Saturdays.

## Do you feel Christchurch is a part of this community?

Yes, very definitely. Old Road East and Echo Square are an important and long established part of Gravesend and Christchurch is like part of the furniture! We know and have gardened for several members of Christchurch before we started working on the church and vicarage grounds, and value our connections with it. Kevin was married at Christchurch and his children were christened there and he is delighted to be able to be working for what he considers his church even though time does not allow him to become more involved at present.


## Lewy Body Dementia

This is not uncommon but it is little known! It took doctors and consultants a long time to diagnose it with Mike. It is caused by protein deposits which disrupt the brains normal functioning. Trembling of the limbs and a tendency to shuffle when walking and experience of detailed and convincing hallucinations are typical. He would be drowsy during the day but unable to sleep at night. He experience vertigo, which caused a fall. He found swallowing difficult and in the end impossible. His voice gradually went. Although it says dementia in his case he was quite sensible and aware of what was going on. I will be grateful to Dr Jill Kent who was determined to get to the root of his problems. She gave all the family confidence to cope with a difficult situation.


## CARING FOR YOUR CHRISTMAS PLANTS

Christmas plants are lovely to receive as gifts. Keep them in good condition with good care.

#### POINSETTIA

Keep in good natural light and keep at normal room temperature between 12C and 21C. Water twice a week from the top of the plant adding liquid food every 14 days.

Never let the plant dry out. Spray daily with water to keep the leaves fresh.



#### CYCLAMEN

They like plenty of light but must be protected from full sun. Keep at 7-15C during the day and 10C at night. Keep the compost moist and stand on a saucer of pebbles and protect from smoke and draughts. When growing and flowering, water twice a week from below adding liquid fertiliser every14 days.

#### AZALEA

Keep in a good light position but not in direct sunlight, ideally at 13C. Never allow to dry out or be waterlogged. Water every second day with lime free water and liquid feed fortnightly. Stand on a saucer with pebbles and spray daily with lime free water.

#### CHRISTMAS CACTUS

Enjoys a light position on a window sill. Do not let the temperature fall below 5-7 C.

Water once a month, spray overhead once a month.
