



A Churchwarden's Notes

Christine and I recently underwent the annual "swearing-in" ceremony at the Cathedral, in which every churchwarden begins their new year in office. The role, in which we represent the Bishop in the church, and whose responsibilities are briefly "to ensure that the PCC maintains, cares for and insures the church buildings and its contents", but also includes the more formal duties seen by everyone during main church services. Not seen, but equally important is the ritual week by week of counting the takings and taking them to the bank!

In churches much older than ours, the churchwardens had a far greater position in a village than almost anyone else. Assistance to the poor from the 16th century onwards was given by the churches and was managed and given out by the churchwardens; and pious bequests to the church (which were increasing in number) began to be invested, administered and supervised. Independent parish funds were set up at this time. Local government as we know it today sprang from the many early parish duties regarding roads, schools and other such things, which all began with being parish responsibilities.

Christ Church began its life at a time when many of those responsibilities were being passed to secular organisations, but fifty years were to pass before our school was relinquished; at least one of the churchwardens commemorated by a window in the church was it's secretary. One of it's teachers was our organist.

Today we churchwardens still have much to do and be responsible for. Any householder knows what a building needs on an almost continual basis. A church is no different - just somewhat bigger. It has to be kept from damage (intended and otherwise); it has to be kept warm and lit. It has to be furnished; it has to have all it needs to carry out its functions; and it has certain legal requirements to fulfil. There is a deal of monitoring carried out - inspections of this and that at regular intervals. We have just had a complete check of all the electrical circuits in the buildings. All such things come with a price tag!

We have to keep what is known as the "Terrier". This, apart from noting all the land belonging to the church, has to include an inventory of all the church's property, and we have to keep a logbook of all alterations, additions and repairs.

Christine and I share our responsibilities. It is easier for me to do some of them, since I am closer at hand. Sue is of course nearer, but why should the vicar have to do all the menial tasks? Christine organises the sidesmen and oversees the Pre-School, helping to sort out its many problems as far as the church is concerned. Of course we don't do these things alone, and are so grateful for those who rally to our assistance when needed.





Christchurch sits firmly in Echo Square and we are investigating this over the next few months by interviewing people whose lives make up this community.

This month I visited Alex at **Bride and Groom Ltd..**

How long have you been at Echo Square?

3 Years but we also have a shop in Bromley High Street which has been there for 20years.

Why did you choose Echo Square?

We all live in the area and knew the shop. We liked it when it was Country Charm, and when the shop became vacant we decided to buy it. It is a good setting for this shop.

What can you tell me about the building?

Not a lot. It is obviously old as it appears on old photos of Echo Square. Before we bought it, it was Country Charm; an Antique Shop before that and a Greengrocers before that.

We have the Men's showroom, changing room and office downstairs and a large attractive bridal showroom and fitting room upstairs.

How many staff do you have?

There are 3 staff. It is a family business. Alex runs the bridal side and Chris, her fiancé, runs the Menswear department downstairs. Angela, a cousin also helps in the Bridal department.

What do you offer to customers?

We have a wide range of wedding dresses to sell, also bridesmaids dresses, head dresses, bags and shoes. We try to offer each customer one and a half hour appointments and we only book in one wedding at any one time to give best attention to each one.

Downstairs Chris has a wide range of suits, waistcoats, ties, cravats, cufflinks and shoes for men mainly to hire though all can be ordered to purchase. Only the white/cream suits are for sale only as they could mark easily.

Bookings need to be made at least 2-3 weeks in advance for a Saturday appointment which is our busiest day. We do mainly fittings during the week though can be flexible.

Our contact number is 01474 567491.

Once fitted, our clothes go to the workshop in Bromley to be altered.

What is it like running a business in Echo Square?

It was a very good move to open here. We have a lot of passing traffic and change our windows every 2 weeks to keep them fresh and interesting. The windows are positioned well for advertising and we have clients from Gravesend, from Kent and from as far away as Leeds!

There is easy parking over the road.

Families who come along for dress fittings often gather in the Echo pub over the road first!

Do you feel ChristChurch is part of the community?

Yes. Sometimes brides we have dressed get married at ChristChurch and we are able to go along and see them at the church.

GARDENING TIPS FOR JULY

July, the time of very active growth in the garden. To maintain this growth, water and feed should be given. Try to water the plants especially those in containers before they call for it and wilt. Feed should be applied little and often. It is a waste to use liquid feed stronger than recommended, as it will only leach though during normal watering bypassing the plants roots. Any shrubs that have flowered can be pruned back, particularly the strong growers such as Dogwoods and Wisterias. Roses should be regularly dead-headed preferably before they have produced hips. Rhododendrons and Azaleas must have their dead flowers removed, by now they should be easily pinched out. This will help prevent diseases attacking next year's flowering buds.



Bristol Cathedral

In the past this was an abbey church. It has a vaulted ceiling. There are attractive alcoves, some of which are painted with red and gold. In the floor the graves stones indicate that in the past man's life span was just to sixty. Some memorials told of the person's attributes and these were very interesting. There was a sculpture of the holy family. It had been done by an artist in Zimbabwe. This was very smooth and tactile. I went to the refectory for coffee. I was advised to take it into the garden. It was so peaceful there. The plants tended to cover the old graves. It was very beautiful.
