## Services of Healing

Once again, on the last Sunday of January, we will have one of our regular services of healing when we have the opportunity to pray for healing and wholeness, for ourselves, for each other, for our family and friends, and for the world -- and indeed for any aspect of our lives here on earth

At the heart of these services we are invited to come forward for the laying on of hands and anointing with the sign of the cross. Some are used to this, for others this may be a new experience. So, let's be clear. There is nothing miraculous about what we are doing here The gift of healing and wholeness is not in our power, but it is in God's power, and when we do those things at the altar rail we are acknowledging that power and calling on it with all our heart and mind and soul and opening ourselves to God's purpose.

But we should also be clear that bringing our

problems to God does not mean that we should expect an instant response to our petitions. God knows what we really need, which may very often not be what we think we need or what we ask and pray for in the heat and pressures of the moment. And we must be prepared, when in the fullness of time God does answer our prayers, for a response which we might well not have expected but which, when it does come, is so obviously the right answer. If you are hesitant about coming forward for whatever reason, if you feel perhaps that is not for you, you may find these words helpful:

"Come, not because you must but because you may, not because you are strong but because you are weak. Come, not because any goodness of your own gives you the right to come, but because you need mercy and help. Come, because you love the Lord a little and would like to love him more. Come, because he loved you and gave himself for you."


## MUSTARD SEED AND OVER 80'S CHRISTMAS TEA

# New research findings published on clergy flourishing

A new set of findings from a 10-year study into the well-being and flourishing of ordained ministers in the Church of England has been published in December 2019

The Living Ministry programme tracks the progress of groups of clergy ordained in 2006, 2011 and 2015 and women and men who entered training for ordination in 2016, seeking to understand what helps clergy to flourish in ministry.

The latest research from the project includes responses from 579 ordained clergy and 113 people training for ordained ministry in the Church of England.

The quantitative study includes research into physical and mental, relational, financial and material and spiritual and vocational well-being as well as responses to questions about ministerial effectiveness.

The Rt Revd Dr Chris Goldsmith, Director of the Ministry Division of the Church of England said: "This 10-year programme is providing valuable long-term insights into the experiences of our ordained clergy from initial training and curacy and throughout ministry.

"The findings will help inform the dioceses and theological education colleges and courses in their vital work in the selection, formation and long-term support of ordained clergy."



Dr Liz Graveling, who is overseeing the research programme for the Ministry Division, said: "I'm pleased to release this next stage of the Living Ministry research, which has allowed us to look in more depth at specific areas of clergy flourishing and start to build up a picture over time. As we follow our participants into the next chapter of their ministry, we are continuing to explore some of these themes in the ongoing qualitative work, which is due to report next year."

#### **Further information:**

Living Ministry was set up in 2016 by the Church of England with the aim of helping support the dioceses, theological education institutions and national church in the selection, training and long-term support of clergy.

Living Ministry is a mixed-methods, longitudinal study. This report presents the findings of Wave 2 of the panel survey, which took place in early 2019. The survey built on the exploration of clergy wellbeing in Wave 1 (2017) by both monitoring this and including questions on ministerial effectiveness.

## The Visitors

Although Bethlehem was full to bursting with people, the fields around the city were quiet and empty, except for a few shepherds and their flocks of sheep. As usual, the men were spending the night under the starry sky, taking turns at sleeping and watching.



Suddenly the night sky above blazed as if it were on fire. It was like trying to look into the full glare of the scorching desert sun. Then a figure appeared, and began to speak. Church of England launches Everyday Faith campaign

From putting the load in a washing machine to entering data and answering emails – the Church of England has launched a new series of reflections and prayers highlighting the value of every day work.



The Everyday Faith campaign aims to help people live out their Christian faith wherever they may be, emphasising how much even the smallest and most routine aspects of our working lives – both paid and unpaid - matter to God and make a difference to others.

The three-week programme starting on January 12 will offer a daily Bible reading, a book of reflections and prayers on the themes of love, faith and hope from authors including the Bishop of Gloucester, Rachel Treweek.

The reflections highlight how the Christian faith has inspired and provided support to people in their working lives, telling the stories of people including a London Underground worker, a teacher, a hairdresser, plumber, a nurse and police officers as well a retired couple.

Launched on Plough Sunday, the traditional start of the agricultural year when many Christian communities ask for a blessing on human labour, the campaign will make use of an app, social media posts and animations.

The campaign is encouraging churches to take part, with suggestions such as a regular 'This Time Tomorrow' slot at services for Sunday worshippers to hear fellow congregation members talk about faith and their working lives.

The Bishop of Gloucester, Rachel Treweek, said: "Living and sharing a Jesus shaped life, that's what everyday faith is all about. It's being with people in the places where they are, places of pain and struggle as well as places of ease and joy."

Dr Nick Shepherd, Director of the Setting God's People Free programme, said: "Going to church is a vital part of a living faith, but so is going to work or school, going on the school run or helping with a community project as a volunteer.

"The Everyday Faith campaign is about highlighting the vital ministry that we have Monday to Saturday through our ordinary lives."
